GENERAL SHOW RULES

- 1. All exhibits must be in place by the end of the setup period in the *Show Schedule*, and must remain in place until the end of Show. No plants or other items may be removed from the displays during the show period without permission from the Show Chair.
- 2. All exhibitors are responsible for their own props for their display.
- 3. Exhibitors are responsible for any damage caused by their display(s) and equipment.
- 4. Any extra lighting is to be brought by the exhibitor and must be requested at the time the display table is booked, so that access to electrical power is available.
- 5. All exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up the area of their display after the show is closed. This includes all extra prop materials such as straw, leaves, branches and water.
- 6. All vendors are required to place exhibits in the show, as laid out in the Vendor Invitation.
- 7. No pricing or other sales information is permitted in the Display Area. Plants from the exhibits may be sold, but only for removal after the Show closes.
- 8. The show committee must approve all signage in all displays. Foothills Orchid Society will supply name placards for exhibitors: individuals, vendors, and visiting societies. The information for these placards will be taken from the registration forms.
- 9. All plants and flowers must be part of a display to be "in the show". The exhibitor must either enter a display or have their entries included in a display. Photography, art and flower arrangements may be entered as individual items, not part of a display. Photography, art and flower arrangements may also be entered as part of a display.

If photography, art and flower arrangements are entered as separate items, not part of a display, the "Display" field in the entry form may be left blank.

- 10. It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure their plant is entered for judging. It is not the responsibility of the entry clerks or show personnel.
- 11. All orchid plants or flowers entered in the plant/flower competition must have been the **property of the exhibitor for at least six (6) months**. Plants not entered in the plant/flower competition are not subject to this rule, even if the display they are in is entered in the Display Competition. That is, displays being judged in the display competition may contain plants which the exhibitor has NOT owned for six months. Entries in the Art and Cut Flower Arrangement category must have been created by the entrant.

All orchid plants in the show, whether entered for ribbon and trophy judging or not, will be eligible for AOS judging. While the AOS judges will examine all the plants in the show looking for plants to consider in detail for an AOS award, if an exhibitor particularly wants the AOS judges to examine a plant the exhibitor may make a request of the AOS Judging Chairperson, who will ensure the plant is examined by the AOS judges.

12. Wild collected plants are discouraged in exhibits.

- 13. All flowers in the show must be orchid flowers. Foliage from non-orchidaceous plants may be used in displays and flower arrangements.
- 14. The *Show Committee* reserves the right to require that inferior or inappropriate exhibits be removed at any time.

JUDGING

General Information

All registered plants, flowers and displays will be eligible for Ribbon Judging and Trophies.

All plants and flowers will be considered for recognition based on present quality, without regard to previous awards. To maintain high standards, no trophies or other recognition will be awarded if in the judges' opinion the flower, plant or exhibit does not warrant such recognition.

All judges and clerks are expected to familiarize themselves with the show rules.

Plant and display ownership must not be visible prior to or during Judging.

American Orchid Society (AOS) Judging

The show has been approved for American Orchid Society judging. Therefore, all plants, flowers and displays in the Display Area, whether or not registered for ribbon judging, will be eligible for AOS judging unless marked 'Not for AOS Judging'.

An American Orchid Society (AOS) sanctioned show must comply with the current rules of the American Orchid Society *Handbook on Judging and Exhibition* and any interim rules issued by the *AOS Judging Committee*. There will be three or more judges accredited by the AOS. The decisions of the judges will be final.

Not for AOS Judging - If the flowers have previously been exhibited at an AOS-approved function, they are considered to have been screened and are not eligible for further consideration. They <u>must</u> be marked, "Not for AOS judging". This will not disqualify the flower from consideration in the proper ribbon or trophy class.

AOS Award Fees - Submission of plants or cut flowers for judging shall obligate the exhibitor to accept any award granted and to pay any fees connected with such an award. If an exhibitor is unwilling to pay the fees, or does not want their plant or exhibit evaluated by the American Orchid Society judges, they must label the plant or exhibit: 'Not for AOS Judging'.

Public Attendance – The American Orchid Society welcomes members of the public to attend AOS judging as observers. Those wishing to do so should report to the AOS Judging Chair.

Ribbon Judging

Plants, flowers and displays for Ribbon Judging must be registered in the Show.

Ribbons - First, second and third place ribbons may be awarded to the best three (3) entries in each class, other than trophy or medal classes. A maximum of one first place ribbon may be awarded per class. If the ribbon judging team feels that the best plant in the class is not of a quality deserving a first place ribbon, then a first place will not be awarded. More than one

second place or third place ribbon may be awarded within the class, if the ribbon judging team considers the entries worthy of such recognition.

Classification - All plants and cut flowers must be correctly entered in the appropriate class, or reclassified by a judge, to be eligible for ribbon judging. The *Ribbon Judging Chair* may combine or subdivide classes. Judges may reclassify entries within their team's currently assigned Classes if the correct class for the entry has yet to be judged. Judges are under no obligation to reclassify incorrectly entered plants. Incorrectly entered plants or flowers may be disqualified by the *Ribbon Judging Team Captain*.

Trophies - All registered plants, flowers and displays are eligible for appropriate trophy classes, if the exhibit is entered properly and show rules are complied with, unless otherwise specified.

RIBBON JUDGING PERSONNEL

Ribbon Judging Chair

This person is responsible for the efficient performance of the judging process. This also includes recording the decisions of the judges, making a record of the awards given, and assigning additional classes to judging teams who have completed their current assignments.

Ribbon Judging Team

Ribbon judging teams are assigned by the chair and have at least three individuals:

Team Captain: Responsible for encouraging a collaborative approach within the team to share knowledge about the plants being judged, and complete the judging of each class in an expeditious manner.

Ribbon Clerk: Responsible for maintaining the ribbon supply, adding class and entry number to each ribbon awarded, and placing the ribbons appropriately.

Spotter: Assists in locating exhibits and plants in the class.

All participants in a ribbon judging team are required to excuse themselves from the class being judged when a conflict of interest occurs, for example, when one of the individual's plants are entered in the class. If an individual excuses themselves they must leave the judging team for the duration of the class, and endeavor to position themselves where they will not overhear discussion on the entries in the class. Further, ribbon judging team members are reminded that deliberations must not be repeated nor discussed with others.

RIBBON JUDGING REGISTRATION

- 1. A separate entry must be made for each plant, flower and exhibit to be Ribbon Judged.
- Online Entries Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to pre-enter their plants, flowers and exhibits. Entry forms can be obtained from the orchid show website: http://www.calgaryorchidshow.com
- 3. **On-site Entries** Exhibitors will need to work with the Registration Clerk to have their entries electronically completed and entered into the judging system.

- 4. **Entry Sticker** Each entry will get one numbered sticker which must be placed on the label for the plant or flower or on the display table or signage designating the judging location (e.g. location "A") for a display.
- Label Each plant, flower must have an easy-to-read label showing the proper name of the plant, clonal name (if assigned), previous awards to the clone and parentage (if a hybrid), e.g. *Cattleya Hippo* 'Pot's Pride' AM/AOS, B/JOGA (C. maxima x C. Potomas). If the name of the plant is unknown, it should be labeled by genus Unknown, e.g. Paphiopedilum Unknown.

This Label is <u>not</u> the typical plastic label which is stuck in the pot.

6. Alliance Class

Each plant may be entered into only **one** Alliance Class. This is related to the type of plant/flower that it is, and may be separated by colour or other characteristics. Where a plant could conceivably fit into more than one class, the exhibitor shall enter it into the first applicable class listed in the *Show Classification and Awards* list. The Registration Clerk may assist with Alliance Class selection.

7. Special Classes

In addition to being entered in one Alliance Class, each plant/ flower may be entered into all appropriate Special Classes (Grown on a window sill, etc).

- 8. In order to be eligible for trophies, plants and exhibits must be entered in the relevant class for Ribbon Judging. No separate entry is required to be considered for the trophy.
- 9. Entries not in accordance with the exhibitor information may be disqualified, and
- 10. No exhibitor may enter for Ribbon Judging, more than three (3) plants or cut flowers of the same species or hybrid in any one class. However, any number of a species or hybrid may be exhibited.
